The meeting started on time with 9 members,but increased with time. Knowing that some members work long hours. I have assured them, it's not the time you arrived at the meeting that's important, but being there is what counts.
Commodore C16 and plus 4, was the topic of the meeting tonight. Jebb Dayton was kind enough to bring in a working C16 and +4. We understand that these two computers were short lived with it's 3.5 BASIC and both were from the so called, 264 Gamily. Jebf Dayton discovered the cartridge that works on the C16,also works on the PLUS/4. Tom Hollinger decided to take a look inside both, and found a similarity. The video chip and the ROM chip are the same. Interchanging chips would be no problem, most are in sockets.
Next, a look at the program " LABEL MAKER" by KEYSTONE. A very easy to use program that runs in 64 mode or 128-40 and 80 column.
Next, a look at BASIC programming again.
This time I wrote it on the wet board and took a deeper look at it,' POKE 1024,102:POKE 55296 , 15 '. I explained what each number did.

P.E.T. Printers

2022 \& 2023
The printer I purchased with my Commodore P.E.T. 2001 computer was a Commodore 2022 dot matrix. I chose the 2022 over the sister 2023 because the 2022 had programmable line spacing with its tractor paper feed mechanism. The 2023 did not have a tractor feed.

The printer received a lot of use from both my brother and me. My brother, Everett, used the 2022 to print out letters in 1979 to companies and to list programs. I used the 2022 to print program listings, name labels, ham radio club newsletters and namelists for hamfests. We also wrote a short program that peeked at every memory location in both P.E.T. computers and printed out the memory location and its value. That was some long listing!.

With this printing we found paper and ribbons were a major expense. The paper expense was reduced by purchasing cartons at the Dayton Hamvention fleamarket for less than $\$ 5.00$ for a 50 lb. carton. We bought and used all 20 cartons.

The ribbon expense was not as easy to reduce. The ribbons were a nylon-fibered with eyeletts, and they were rated at $2,000,000$ characters before replacement. The computer supply catalogs wanted over $\$ 1.50$ per ribbon. At the Dayton Hamfest fleamarket under a table we found some old messy teletype ribbons from military surplus, which worked fine if you didn't mind rewinding on to a different spool. To make the ribbons last longer we tried reinking with pen ink, but this didn't work evenly. The best reinking fluid we found was some crankcase oil from a 7 year old Diesel tractor that never had an oil change in its life!!!! .

To help dry the printouts as the paper came out of the printer we allowed the sunshine coming in the East window to shine on the paper and try to dry the oil-based ink. The smell from the ink and warm transformer was always a concern from our parents, but it never bothered us brothers.

The only real repair $I$ had to do was when a mailing label came off in the printer and gummed up the works. After cleaning the parts with rubbing alcohol the printer worked fine, and I learned not to leave name labels strips in a printer.

THINGS I USED TO KNOW ABOUT THE C64 AND THE Cl28 BUT HAD FORGOTTEN OR: THINGS I NEVER KNEW BUT WISH I HAD KNOWN by John J. Donnangelo

1. Have you ever wondered who the wizards were that developed the C128 ? Well each time you power up your C128, they are ready to tell you. Just enter the following command and then you too will know who they are: SYS32800, 123, 45,6
2. On a C64, if you do not want any one to be able to list your BASIC program, just hide a POKE 775,200 somewhere in your program to disable the LIST command. Of course if that someone remembers that a POKE 775,167 will enable LIST, you won't have gained too much.
3. We now use all kinds of high tech methods, such as word processors, utility programs,etc., when all we want to do is read a sequential file. Do you remember that the following command will do it also: LOAD"filename,s",8? It's our same old "LOAD, 8 "routine with a ", s" after the file name.
4. Speaking of high tech utilities, remember that one-liner for a screen dump (print everything on your screen to a printer)? Here it is for those who never knew:

## 10 OPEN3,3:OPEN4,4[PRINT"H":FORI=0T0999:GET\#3, A\$:PRINT\#4,A\$; :NEXT:CLOSE3:CLOSE4

( Note that in the PRINT" $H$ " the "H" represents the HOME KEY, that is hit the CLR-HOME key without shifting. And don't miss the ";" (semicolon) after the "PRINT\#4,A\$". And yes,it will fit in one line. On the 40 column screen it goes two screen lines with one space left over for the cursor.)
5. It's easy to center a line of text on the 40 column screen ( C 64 or C 128 ), if you let the computer figure it out. Here are the lines to do it:

> 10 A\$="Commodore Computer Club"
> 20 PRINT TAB $((27-\mathrm{LEN}(A \$)) / 2) ; \mathrm{A}$
( Count your parenthesis. Three left and three right.)

The above lines assume that $A \$$ is no more than 28 characters. If it's more, or if you are on a C128 80 column screen, then you'll have to adjust the " 27 ".

## Painless 8/9 DRIVE Select

I have discovered an interesting method of adding unit eight/nine selection to a 1541 . My technique does not require any external switches, only a single two inch wire inside the case.

Open up the drive and expose the main PC board. If you don't know how to do this, then you probably shouldn't be trying this modification.

Cut the PCB jumper labeled E1. There are two of these, E1 and E2. E1 is nearer the front. They are about a quarter inch in diameter, and close to the center of the board about two inches back from the front edge. There is a thin strip of metal connecting the two halves. Carefully cut it with a sharp knife. Reconnect the drive to the computer, put in a disk and see if you can LOAD" $\$$ ", 9 . If the drive comes to life, then the jumper has been completely cut.

Now carefully solder a two inch wire to the right hand half circle of E1.

Next find R44. This is a 100 K resistor (brown, black and yellow ) between UD1 (a 7406 ) and UD2 (a 7417 ). These are near the long connector on the left edge of the board. Solder the other end of the two inch wire to the end of R44 nearest the front of the drive.

Connect the drive to the computer and with no disk in the drive, turn on the 1541. You should be able to use it normally as good old unit \#8.

Now turn the drive off, insert a disk half way, and turn it back on. You will find the unit now is number nine.

HOW DOES IT WORK?....
Glad you asked. You have just wired the disk controller address option pad to the write protect sensor. Since the 1541 reads these option pads on power up,if you have the write protect sensor blocked when you turn it on, the drive becomes a nine. If there is no disk or a non-write protected disk in the drive, it will be unit \#8. Sure beats boring holes in the case. by Jim Harvey, 18538 Inkster, Redford, MI. 48240

Easily copying 1541 disks to FD-2000 is now on disk for your usage. Load the FD-2000 with the FD Utilities disk. Type LOAD "FD-UTILITIES", 10 and hit RETURN.
The Main Menu will load; put the cursor on DISK FORMATTING OPTIONS and hit RETURN. You will see a divider box listing TYPE, DENSITY, PARTITIONS using the " + " key. Change PARTITIONS to NONE and hit RETURN. A message screen will tell you to insert the disk to be formatted and hit any key to begin. Be sure to format all the disks you will need. Return to Main Menu and cursor down to PARTITIONS OPTIONS.
From the Partitions Menu cursor down to CREATE PARTITIONS and hit RETURN.
You will see a divider box listing NUMBER, NAME, BLOCKS, TYPE.
The Number shows the partition number, press RETURN and the TYPE block is highlighted. Use the " + " key and change TYPE to "1541", hit RETURN and the NAME block is highlighted. Enter any file name you want and hit RETURN. You will see a message " ADD THIS PARTITION? ", enter ' YES' and hit RETURN. Make partitions as needed, and remember to change each partition name, so the drive won't have trouble locating the proper partition.
When you are done making partitions, answer the question with a ' NO '. A message will appear "WRITE NEW PARTITION TABLE?", answer ' YES ' and hit RETURN. These new partitions will be added to disk. You will be returned to the PARTITION TABLE again, just cursor down to MAIN MENU and hit RETURN. The MAIN MENU appears, cursor down to BASIC hit RETURN, exiting the program.

From the FI-UTILITIES disk, LOAD "MCOPY", 10 and hit RETURN, and RUN. Turn on the 1541 Drive and insert the disk to be copied. The MCOPY screen will show you SOURCE box, TARGET box, and STATUS box. Under these boxes are the following keys:

> F1 - SET SOURCE DEVICE
> F3 - F4 SET SOURCE PARTITION
> F5 - SET TARGET DEVICE
> F7 - F8 SET TARGET PARTITION C - BEGIN COPYING

Remove the MCOPY utility disk and insert the disk you partitioned.
This disk will receive the information of $f$ the 1541 drive. Bress each key as listed above and the information will be intered into the boxes. To begin copying just press the " C " key.

This program is designed to help everyone to copy easily from the 1541 to the FD-2000.
