"THE COMMODORE STORY" (PART 4)

Legend has it that Jack Tramiel was accosted in the corridor one day by Chuck Peddle who told him to forget about hand-held calculators saying "What about a desktop computer?"

"Let's build it!" exclaimed Tramiel in response and they set to work on what was to be the Commodore PET, revolving around MOSTek's new 6502 chip.

The news that Commodore Business Machines was working on a computer was greeted with an unbelievable silence. In early 1976 the United States micro computer establishment was made up of hobbyists, hackers and small gifted engineers who worked and toiled on kitchen tables and in basements with soldering irons and "salvaged" electrical components.

There were absolutely no commercially available microcomputers simply because there was no recognized or foreseeable market for them.

This situation did not discourage Jack Tramiel whose philosophy was that "they, the public, doesn't know yet what they need!"

The vision Tramiel envisioned

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for the future of the Commodore PET and CBM's role in it is understandably illustrated by the naming of the new computer. While the official name of Commodore's first microcomputer was the Personal Electronic Transactor, from the day of its introduction it was known simply by its initials "P.E.T." or PET. This warm and personal ancronym tamed a device which was sure to bring out the technophobe in even the most worldly of the North American and overseas public!

Strange to relate, Jack Tramiel later admitted that he had no inkling what people would do with a home computer of their own but he had sensed the opportunity and the potential, figuring that if he gave the general public a low cost computer they would find a use for it!

Chuck Peddle was given six months time and a five man engineering crew to create the PET. The introduction of the first home computer was to be unveiled at the June 1977 Consumer Electronics Show.

Humorously enough, still unfinished PETs were created and transported to that C. E. Show where Peddle worked for three days, without sleep, to get them working well enough to exhibit and operate.

The prototypes were built entirely by hand with wooden housings that were painted to look like metal, using rust-resistant paint. Zenith television sets were built into their housings. Zeniths were used mainly because a nearby store happened to have them on

sale! The tuners were removed from each chassis and remaining components were re-wired to serve as black and white monitors. They also had brought Sanyo tape recorders and had added their own circuitry for built-in data storage. The keyboard was a tightly packed patch of calculator-style metallic keys!

These 8K machines were \$795, an amazingly low price. Soon Commodore was receiving fifty calls average per day from dealers wanting to sell the PET! (PART FIVE IS NEXT!)
