

EXPANDING GEOS

There's no doubt that GEOS offers more possibilities for creative expression than any other program for the C64/C128. And, since the program was first introduced, there has been a contnual stream of improvements, new ideas, and new ways to use both old and new equipment.

The latest addition to my GEOS "tool kit" is the 1750 (512K) Memory Expansion for my C128. Before I made the purchase, I'd read message after message on QuantumLink about what a world of difference a memory expansion board made, but frankly, I was still skeptical. Could a RAM disk really change things that much? I bought the 1750 primarily to use with my telecomm and word processing programs, but one of the very first things I did when it arrived was to load in GEOS to see if the folks who were singing its praises were right.


The answer is a resounding YES!

First, though, a bit of background information. The 1700 and 1750 are memory expansions for the C128 only. They draw too much power to be used on the C64 (which is why the 1764, the C64 expansion, comes with a new power supply).

And somewhere along the line, apparently, the folks at Commodore got the notion that GEOS is strictly a program for the C64 -- because although they include a GEOS upgrade disk with the 1764, they *don't* include it with either of their C128 memory expansions. Without the upgrade, GEOS won't recognize the extra memory at all -- which makes life difficult, to say the least. The upgrade disk can be found in most of Berkeley's latest releases, and packed in with the 1351 Mouse, so it's not difficult to come by, but the fact remains that Commodore *should* have recognized that 128 users are also GEOS users. Fortunately for me, I had upgraded my disk when I bought the 1351.

Once you've gotten an upgraded disk, by whatever means (it's perfectly legitimate to use someone else's disk to upgrade yours with) you'll find some files on it that deal specifically with the RAM expansion: CONFIGURE and RBOOT.

Double-clicking on the CONFIGURE file will give you a dialogue box (illustrated below in its "one drive" configuration) in which you can see your current configuration options, and change them if you wish.



You can reconfigure your setup at any time, to suit your particular needs. Here's what you can do:


(I) Set up a 1541 RAM drive, either along with or instead of your "real time" disk drive(s). This means that you are using your RAM expansion like a 1541 drive, and you can do anything with it

that you could do on a "real" drive, such as store and delete files, copy, rename, run geoPaint, Desktop, etc. but *without* having to wait for the usual eons that a 1541 would take. You must be sure, though, that anything you change on such a drive, and want to keep, is transferred to a disk before you quit the program, or your changes will be lost. You copy files from a RAM disk to a "real" disk exactly the same as you would copy from one "real" disk drive to another--by moving the ghost icon over the icon of the drive you wish to copy to.

I have found that some programs won't run from the RAM drive. GeoDUMP is one I had particular trouble with.


(II) "Shadow" your 1541 drive(s). When you choose "shadowing," you're using the memory expansion and the "real" drive together. (Think of the memory expansion as "casting a shadow" between your keyboard and your disk drive.) Data is read from the disk into the memory, where it becomes instantly available (as with a "straight" RAM disk, no more long waits for disk-read access). After that, whenever you do something that *writes* to the disk, the data goes into the memory and *also* to the "real" disk. You don't have to remember to save the contents of RAM to a disk before you quit; it's already been done for you. The "shadowed drive" configuration is the default setting in the CONFIGURE file.

My only complaint is that you're still limited to a total of two drives. It would be nice to have two "real" drives *plus* the RAM drive, but that isn't possible. I hope that will change in future releases.



There are also some interesting quirks in the program if you try to add a drive. As an experiment, I switched off my 1541 (drive B) and rebooted the program. I then tried to use the "add drive" option from the menu. Nothing seemed to happen. So, out of curiosity, I double-clicked on the CONFIGURE file. *Then* drive B whirred, and I got the dialogue box illustrated below. It's somewhat different from either the "one drive" or "two drive" boxes I'd already seen.

I then tried to click on the "shadowed 1541" box for Drive B, and that gave me the "normal" two-drive box. From there, I just made sure that I had both drives shadowed (the default configuration).



The RBOOT file is used to re-boot GEOS if you've left it to run a program that uses certain areas of memory or replaces the RESTORE vector. If you've left GEOS with the "SPECIAL" menu, you can return to it by simply pressing the RESTORE key. And if you've taken a moment to copy DeskTop into the expansion, GEOS will reboot in less than ten seconds.

After I'd finally gotten the system configured, I decided that a full-page geoPaint graphic might be a good test of the expansion's capabilities, so I got the "lobster" graphic created by BSW and loaded it in. According to the upgrade documentation, I was then using the "Move Data" kernal routine to move data within the memory instead of within the computer. Whatever the routine is called, the result was nothing short of amazing.

I'd gotten accustomed to a long wait while trying to scroll around a geoPaint file. I'd click on the "arrows" icon, then listen to the disk whir for a while, move the image a bit, listen to the disk whir, and so on and so on, especially with vertical moves. Not any more. Whether vertical, horizontal, or diagonal, the image on the screen moved smoothly and with nary a peep from the disk drive. I had the full page at my command. For the first time, I felt that GEOS was really living up to its reputation of being a "Macintosh environment on the C64." I'll bet the 128 version of geoPaint will be even more spectacular in 80 columns.

If you're creating your own geoPaint graphics, take a moment to click on each of the drawing icons before you begin. This will load them into memory, and you won't have to wait for a disk load while you're drawing. Granted, the usual wait wasn't particularly long, but anyone who uses GEOPaint a lot will appreciate having the drawing tools *instantly* available. And you'll also find, both in geoPaint and in geoWrite, that once you've accessed any particular file, it remains in the memory. So you can quit, go do something else, and return to that file almost instantly. I used that particular feature several times while I was writing this article, moving back and forth between the article and its graphics.

INSIDE GEOS MASTER BLASTER

Well hello again. This month we are going to take a short detour from what we have been doing to answer a few questions that have been asked over the months.

Before we get started though I need to correct an error from my last article. In the example I gave in compaction the third number should be 132 (128+4) not 4. Sorry about that. By the way there's one more hint I'd like to give you - try to write all of the data in hex and all of the compaction bytes in decimal. This makes it much easier to see what's going on. Also if your assembler will allow it use 128+4 instead of 132. It makes it much easier to see which form of compaction is being used and how many bytes are affected.

TRAPPING C= KEYPRESSES

The first question we will discuss this time is that of using keypresses to drive your menus. For instance C= C closes the disk in the Desktop. This is actually alot easier then you might think. First though let's go over the key (no pun intended) memory locations:

KEYDATA (\$8504) - Here is where the value of the last key pressed is placed by the Main Loop of Geos.

KEYVECTOR (\$84A3) - If this vector is non-zero then the routine it points to willed be called whenever a key is pressed.

The only Geos routine we'll use is **GetNextChar** (\$C2A7) which we'll use to empty the keyboard buffer.

Okay here's how we'll do it. First you have to understand that whenever the Commodore key is pressed in combination with another key then that keys value plus 128 is placed in KeyData.

We aren't limited to Commodore combinations however; any key can be parsed out this way. What we're going to do is point KeyVector at our routine. The routine will then step through a table we have set up looking for a match. Watch this: assume that we want to intercept three keypresses:

C= C - Calls a routine called CLOSE.

C= R - Calls a routine called RECALL.

C= U - Calls a routine called UPDATE.

First we'll set KeyVector to point at our routine:

LDA #< wedge : STA KeyVector LDA #> wedge : STA KeyVector + 1

Now for the wedge itself:

WEDGE LDY #0; initialize index W1 LDA table, y: BEQ nokey; end of table.

CMP keydata: BEQ foundkey; we have a match INY:INY:INY:BNE W1; try next entry in table.

FOUNDKEY LDA table+2,y: PHA

LDA table + 1,y: PHA

SUC JSR GetNextChar : CMP #0 : BNE SUC

NOKEY RTS

Now for the table itself:

TABLE .byte 128+"u":.word UPDATE - 1

.byte 128+"c" : .word CLOSE - 1 .byte 128+"r" : .word RECALL - 1

.byte 0

The function of the WEDGE routine is really quite simple. It compares the first byte in the table with the value in KEYDATA. If the bytes don't match then the routines skips over the two byte address which follows the value in the table and then trys the next value. This will continue until either a match is found or the value in the table is zero. Remember we're dealing with ASCII here not PETSCII. The letters in quotes in the table

are for illustration purposes only, you would use the proper number (ASCII A is 97).

If the bytes match then the address that's compiled in the table just after the value is pushed onto the stack. Note that the address is one less then the actual address you wish to call. This is because when a RTS is executed the address on the stack is incremented before being loaded into the instruction register. The net result is that when a match is found then the routine will be executed.

You can use this method to test for any keypress you wish. In my GeoIcon V2 program I not only use this method for C= commands but also to allow simulating a joystick with the keyboard.

By the way the SUC routine is used to suction off any extra keys in the keyboard buffer. This way if your routine opens a dialog box that requests text from the user there won't be anything left over in the buffer to confuse the issue.

DATAFILES

Another popular question is how to allow clicking a datafile to start your application. The relevent memory locations are as follows:

R0L - LoadOpt flag. This byte is passed to your application after it is loaded. There are two bits of concern here: bit 7 will be set if a datafile was clicked on rather then the main file. Bit 6 will be set if the user clicked on the PRINT option of the Desktop. Needless to say BSW''s Reference Guide has a typo here -- it says bit 1 instead of bit 7 (in several places in fact). Believe me I learned the hard way that it's bit 7!

If bit 6 or 7 is set then the following two locations contain valid data:

R2 - Points to a null terminated buffer containing the name of the disk containing the datafile.

R3 - Points to a null terminated buffer containing the filename of the datafile that was clicked on.


It is a good idea to save these variables somewhere until after your program finishes it's initialization sequence. Then it can pull the values out from where they were stashed and check their values

The only other thing you need to set up is the parent application block of the datafile's header block. This tells the Geos Kernal what program to load when the file is clicked on. This is the area that is used to store the author's name in application files -- offset 117 - 136. Make sure that the name stored here matches the application file's name EXACTLY. Case is important so be careful. The version string isn't checked however although your program can check this to find out if the datafile is compatable.

Note that the datafile will NOT actually be loaded, that is up to the application itself. After all the datafile may not necessarily be stored in contiguous memory locations or it may be compacted in some form. The Kernal merely tells you the name of the file that was clicked on and whether printing was requested. By the way if printing was requested then your application should print the data and then exit back to the Desktop. If your application doesn't print data then it should ignore bit 6 of the LoadOpt flag and simply load in as normal (or possibly just exit straight back to the Desktop).

Well that's about it for this time. In upcoming issues I plan to include several articles like this one that answers questions that I've received so please, if you have any questions about programming with Geos don't hesitate to send them in. If I don't know the answer I will be able to find it (or program it). Next time we'll be discussing Dialog boxes and their various options. I'll see you then. MB

permanent disk storage. Somehow, the joy of moving that cute little geoPaint icon over to the wastebasket just didn't have the same appeal.



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
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Desk-Top Publishing

Mouse Maintenance If you find that your trusty 1351 mouse is no longer sliding gracefully across your screen as it once did, maybe it's time for a tune-up. Disconnect your mouse and flip it over so that the roller ball is exposed. Remove the cover holding in the ball and remove the roller ball. Look carefully at the 3 metal rollers, these tend to get gummed up over time. Using a pencil erasor, bobby pin, paper clip or an X-Acto knive, carefully scrape away the build-up on the three mtal rollers. Be careful not to let any of this residue fall into the inner housing of mouse. Wipe the ball with a clean handkerchief and reinstall it. Replace the retainer cover, flip it back over, plug it in & away you go!

weird "installation" problems. It's now on the BBS.





As I mentioned, using the expansion with geoWrite is just as much fun. The difference isn't as apparent while you're *creating* documents, because not so much of geoWrite is disk-dependent. But if you're looking through a long document, take a moment to preview it first. The first preview will take a "normal" amount of time to display. But after that, the document is in memory, and all subsequent previews and "gotos" will be amazingly fast. If you're creating a document, each page is entered in the memory as you create it, so you can "goto" quickly right from the start. As a matter of fact, sometimes it works a bit faster to use the "goto page" option instead of "next page" or "previous page" off the menu. Using C = + or C = - was faster as well.

One of the reasons that GEOWrite was never my word processor of choice was the aggravating amount of time it took to get from one part of a document to another. I'd become accustomed to the ease of maneuvering I'd found in other word processing programs, and found geoWrite frustrating in the extreme, despite its many very positive features. So I tended not to use it unless I really wanted fancy grophics or fonts in what I was creating. The memory expansion has taken care of a lot of the access problems, so I'll definitely be using geoWrite more often in the future, especially when I can get my hands on GEOS 128. (Gee, the more I think about it, the more I begin to think that GEOS 128 will be even more the "ideal" program!)

I don't have any of the other BSW programs such as geoDex or geoFile, but I'm sure that having the memory expansion would make a major difference in using them as well. And, to tell you the truth, now that I've seen what a difference it makes, I'm far more likely to buy them. I'll be particularly interested in geoPublish, since I've worked with IBM-based "desktop publishing" programs, and I'm sure geoPublish will be well worth the wait (eat your heart out, Big Blue!)

Adding the memory expansion certainly added many extra dimensions to GEOS. The program always had great potential, although in its initial form it did have room for improvement. Adding the capabilities provided by extra memory has brought GEOS that much closer to perfection. *End*


