New Life For Old Friends **By Steve Smelson**

Do you have an old Commodore printer gathering dust somewhere? If so, there could be some new life for it.

As for myself, I never even owned a computer until this year, when the kids across the street gave me an old C-64 which they had found in a neighbors trash. Having an interest in electronics. I set out to repair this old relic and to my surprise, this piece of trash turned out to be a jewel in the rough.

After getting the C-64 working, I purchased a used 1541 disk drive and a used Commodore MPS-803 printer. The 1525, MPS-801, and MPS-803 printers do not have descending characters, which means, the letters p. y. j. and g in lower case are moved up to sit on top of the line of print, which not only looks strange, but also makes it difficult to read at times.

I had been looking for a program to overcome this drawback when a friend gave me some old issues of RUN magazine. In RUN's May 1981 issue, I found an article called PrintRite 64. This program, by Bob Kodadek, added the much needed descenders and will work with most word processor programs. This program was also written to load RUNScript 64, a wordprocessor. by Rober Rockefeller, which was published in two parts in RUN's March and April 1986 Issues. When used together, these programs also add the much needed underline frature. RUNScript 64 can also be customized to work with other brands of printers.

With RUN going out of business, obtaining a back copy could be a problem, but the club has a copy of this magazine in our magazine library. You can check with Roger Serianni to see about obtaining this copy.

I like my MPS-803 printer because of its compact size. And now that the printing problems have been solved because of these programs, I Continued On Page 3

NEWBY CORNER III by Danny M. Koleski

I wanted to give you a few odds and ends this month. shortcuts, tips and little tidbits I've come across over the past few years. You might find something in here you can use.

CARTRIDGE RESET-When using your various fastloader cartridges, one option is to disable the cartridge. The only problem with most cartridges is that the only way to reset them is to turn the computer off and back on again. I don't know that this works with all cartridges, but thy this to reset you system without turning it off. SYS 57194.

AUTO FILE CLOSER-When a program involves working with disk files, an error can sometimes leave files open by mistake. The indication for this is an illuminated red LED after the program has run its course. Failing to close the file at this point can corrupt it on the disk, so discretion says it must be closed. The following simple line will do the job. OPEN 15.8,15 CLOSE 15

DISK DRIVE CRASH TEST-The 1541 disk drive has a habit of occasionally locking up in the middle of an operation. When you are loading or saving a long program, you often don't know if the operation is still going on, or if your system has locked up. To check if the operation is still going on, press the shift/Commodore combination a few times and watch the screen. If the characters shift between upper- and lowercase, the operation is still going on. Don't expect the shift to occur every time, as the computer is working with the disk and reading the keyboard. but if the shift doesn't occur after several tries, you can assume the disk is locked up and you should restart your system.

DISK CRASH F1X-On those occasions when some messed-up 1/O opeation causes the 1541 to become "Not Present," you can often regain its attention with POKE144,0 on both the VIC and the C 64. Location 144 holds the Status word (ST), and clearing it usually clears up the disk problem as well.

DISK SAVE TIP-You can save some time by combining your disk Save and Verify commands on one line like this

SAVE "programname",8: VERIFY" **,8

REVIEW SWIFTLINK-232 by Danny M. Kolesk

Since all of these newsletters have been coming across my desk, I have had the opportunity to read about several programs and products I would probably not have heard about otherwise. In this installment and future ones, I intend to present to you some of the reviews I have come across. In some cases, I have already purchased the software reviewed, but since I have not become fully knowledgeable with them yet, I will give to you the review as I received it.

This months review is on a product called Swift link 232. The review is taken from C-H.U.G. Gazette of Fremont California which took the article from ADAK Computer Users Group News, Dec 1990 (D/L from Q-Link) Via CHUG Inc. Via Commodore Computers Country Club users Group, Pinellas Park, Florida, with thanks.

The Commodore 64 and 128 arc two of the best values in 8 bit computers today. But, lets face it, they weren't engineered to meet the demands of the recent revolution in high-speed telecommunication. While prices continue to drop on 2400, 9600, and 19200 bps moderns, Commodore owners seem to be stuck in the slow lane. Some enterprising software engineers have been able to push the C-64 to 2400 bps but usually with only a 40 column display and not always reliably. If you have needed 80 columns with terminal emulation or if you are faced with noisy phone lines, you are out of luck. The C-128 can go somewhat faster, but reliability can be a problem above 2400 bps. And what about C/PM? A paltry 1200 is all that it has been able to manage. Is there any reason why your C-64/C-128 has to be so pokey when it comes to serial communications? Not any more! Swiftlink -232 is your ticket to 9600 bps, 19200 bps and beyond. One small car tridge has the functionality that CBM left out of the C-64/C-128 so you can bring your machine into the '90's. Here are me of the features

** Super-quick speeds Swiftlink can accelerate your C-64/C-128 to interface with the fastest modems 2400, 4800, 9600, 19200, and even 38400 bps! ** Terminal software included: Swiftlink 232 comes with all the software you'll need to communicate at warp speeds. Desterm 128 (C128), Terminal one (C-64) Kermit (C-64/C128), Q-Term (CP/M) and others. ** Compact design: Swiftlink-232 is about the size of a standard cartridge (25/8* x 3 1/2*) and plugs into the computer's expansion (car tridge) port. ** Industry -standard interface: Swiftlink -232 has an IBM-AT style db-9 serial connector so you can connect it to any standard modem or network link quickly and economically. All five handshaking lines (DTR, RTS,

CTS, and DCD) are supported.

** Flexibility: Swiftlink 232 can be configured to live at an addresses in memory to insure that it will allow communication with other cartridges you may own.
** Compatibility: Swiftlink-232 is completely compatible with all of CBM's RAM expansion units.

You no longer have to worry about how to exchange files with your second computer if it's not a 64 or 128. ** Best of all you can get all this power without draining your wallet-Swiftlink-232 is priced at a very affordable S29 95 (cable extra). In fact, Swiftlink-232 interfaces for the 64/128's use port!

NOTE: Swiftlink-232 is <nob designed to work iwth a modern that plugs directly into the user port. It <iss designed to work with any Hayes-compatible modern and many others. (C-HUG's Editor comments: The date at the top of this article may indicate this item is no longe available. If available and if it works as indicated, it might be just what some of us need. hg)
