The Presidents Message

At our last meeting I asked for input on what kind of things the club as a whole wanted to see presented. The over all input received was for more presentations on telecommunications, GEOS and The Big 3 (word processing, spreadsheet and database applications). Well this Feb. meeting is a direct response to the first of these requests.

At this meeting we have Garth demoing some of the things that a modem owner can do with his equipment and some of the services available to them. We hope to spend more time on telecommunications and answer some questions you have about modems and their uses.

Telecommunications is becoming more and more common place with computer users. It opens up your computer to the vast information pool out there in the world and allows you to connect to other computers. You can talk to other computer users by dialling up a Public BBS or a Commercial BBS and typing in messages addressed from you to whoever it is you want to type to. The other person at a later time can call the same BBS at his/her convenience and receive your message, read it and reply back to you.

Besides messages, you can browse around and look at different areas available on the BBS and look at programs or files that you can get for next to free. The only cost to you is your time and phone costs. The Public BBS' are usually free access and have very active message areas and a large selection of files for the taking. Their download sections (where the files are kept) usually range from 0 to several megs to hundreds of megabytes (1,000,000 bytes). There are several dozen BBS' here in Regina that are absolutely free. Commercial ones on the other hand, are very large and have several gigabytes of files on line and most of them have costs associated with them as well as long distance charges. Compuserve, Genie and Quantumlink to name a few.

These giants in telecommunications conger

up images of large computer main frames that take up several thousand square feet located in a far away major metropolitan city that costs money to access. In fact they do. They have hundreds if not thousands of areas. Like on line shopping, on line banking, Dow Jones Stock Exchange Prices, on line conferences for software developers (or any other special interest groups called sigs),interactive games where you play games with another caller, a CB channel where you can listen in on a so called CB channel and start up a convo with someone in Australia or Mexico and so on. The services are vast and in some cases outright ridiculous.

There are several BBS' here in Regina that are run commercially on a smaller scale and the costs are very reasonable. These BBS' are usually run by computer vendors like FACT Computers, TTL and Computerway to name a few. These local BBS' charge very little, if at all for their services. FACT Computer for example is probably the fastest growing BBS in Regina and boasts over a gigabyte of files (1,000,000,000 bytes) and do not charge for on line time but do limit your time and how many bytes you can take. For 20.00 per year, you are allowed 3 hours of on line time and unlimited downloading privileges.

You probably already know that this club itself has a BBS with a very large message base and over 40 megs of on line storage which is now over 2/3 full of various files free for the taking. All you need to do is dial 543-7683 via your modem, log on and try things out and see what it will do for you. All it would cost you is your time. It will increase the usefulness of your computer. Have a question or problem? Leave a message describing your problem and wait for a reply (usually by the next day). Chances are, you will get an answer. Have something to sell, leave a message in the FOR Sale Message Area. Like to talk about technical things like programming, electronics, repairing things, cars, Cds or what have you, LEAVE A MESSAGE. Its another great way to have a conversation with somebody and make new friends.
