

If you don't have a 1520 but would like to buy one, Software Exchange had one the last time I was in there. We also received some new Geopaint art work. In lieu of the fact that we will now be paying rent, we need to address some new ways to increase revenues. We don't want to raise the annual dues. Consider this. If you buy a disk from the club and then have us copy to both sides it will cost \$1.50 per disk thus saving you \$2.50 (plus shipping) over the mail order price. If you use your own disk and to the copying on your own equipment, there is no charge. In an effort to

Log-On

Greetings fellow 8 bit club members! As most of you probably know I am the Co-sysop of the Commodore section on Sherer-N-Place BBS. If you haven't yet dived into the modem world then you're missing a great deal of fun and information. Sherer-N-Place BBS is our club's official BBS (Bulletin Board Service) where you can get a hold of other club members such as Nate, Dale, Justin, Myself, or others of our group. You can post messages to them and ask them questions, or just read the other mail that is going on that is posted as non-private. Through this you can find out what is going on in the Computer world or just around Wichita. Besides the Commodore section their are a lot of other S.I.G.s (Special Intrest Groups) that are available on SNP. Everything from a cooking section to sale/wanted ads and every major computer brand is supported here. There are even messages bases that are devoted to auto/home repair, a singles board, USA Today-Online, Christian topics, jokes, Ham Radio S.I.G.s, and even online games.



Besides all of the Message Bases there is a "Files Section" which is full of Public Domain and Shareware programs that can be downloaded from their computer to your computer

which you can save to disk and then can run on your computer at any time. The files section in the Commodore section has C=64, C=128, and C=CPM+ programs set up in three different file bases resectively. In addition if you have Nate's "Super Wave Play" then you can go into the IBM files and download some of the smaller sound files (800k or less) depending what size drive you have. Or if you have a GIF Viewer then you can go into the Art Graphics section and download GIFS.

And last but not least when you post a message, you can also choose to enclose a file with it for the person that you are posting to, and if you toggle the message as private then only that person and the sysops have access to the file. This Letter was written using **GeoWrite 2.1** (128-80 column mode) and then I posted a message to Dale Lutes and enclosed this file within the message using the prompts on my screen [**(F)ile**]. Then when Dale reads the message all he has to do is download this file right into his News Letter!

Dale has said that he can use **GeoWrite**, and standard ASCII files and move them right into his **GeoPublish** files, which he uses to create the Newsletter with. The great thing about using SNP to post these to Dale is that you can leave them on the board anytime day or night and Dale can retrieve them at a time that is conveinent for him. If you have any questions see either Dale or me at the club meeting or give us a call and we'll see if we can get you the answers you need.

Random Access

FD series drives (part 1):

I've gotten quite a few questions, lately, about my FD-2000 disk drive from Creative Micro Designs. I thought that I might use this month's Random Access to tell you a little about it.

The FD-2000 and it's big brother the FD-4000 use $3^{1/2}$ inch floppy disks as does the Commodore 1581. The main difference in these three drives is raw capacity as summarized in the table below:

Drive	1581	FD-2000	FD-4000
Capacity	800K	1600K	3200K
Disk type	DD	HD	ED

Note that in order to reap the benefits of higher capacity, you must use higher density disks. The cost per disk should be considered before purchasing a drive. For instance, the enhance density (ED) disks store twice as much data as the high density (HD) disks, but may cost three times as much. The FD-series drives **can** format, read, and write the lower density disks.

Another big difference between the FD drives and the 1581 is the partitioning feature. The FD drives can divide the disk into as many as 31 **partitions**. Each is treated as if it were a completely separate disk. This is a little different from partitions on the 1581 drive (more on that in just a bit).

There are two different kinds of partitions on the FD drive: emulation mode, and native mode. The emulation mode partitions duplicate the storage and directory/BAM structure of the Commodore 1541, 1571, or 1581 drives These are provided for compatibilty with software that runs only from one of these type of drives (the GEOS desktop, for example). Native mode partitions can be as small as 256 blocks or as large as the You choose the size in 256-block entire disk. increments. Native mode partitions can contain MS-DOS style subdirectories (roughly equivalent to what the 1581 calls "partitions". It is perfectly OK to mix and match the different partition types on the same disk.

I hope this has whetted your appetite. I'll be back next month with more on the FD-series drives.


